Opening Remarks

Tom Watson, NRCS State Conservationist Tom welcomed everyone and thanked them for their participation.

Maureen Wicks, FSA State Executive Director Maureen introduced herself and thanked attendees for showing up and looks forward to interacting with the group.

Les Rispens, FSA, discussed overlap of federally funded conservation easements and the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). CRP contracts that are in place prior to the conservation easement will finish out the contract, but then not be eligible again.

Rob Molacek, NRCS State Conservation Engineer

Rob presented a list of engineering practices to be updated in the near future and asked about the interest in getting a water subcommittee back up and running again. This subcommittee has been inactive for the last several years. DEQ agreed with Rob and their presentation after lunch is on the topic of the subcommittee.

Kelley Barkell, NRCS Assistant State Conservationist for Financial Assistance Programs

Kelley reviewed the Climate Smart Ag and Forestry list and asked for input from the group on proposed additions to the list. Kyle will email the list out and ask input following the meeting. Kelley also responded to a question about why Upland Wildlife Habitat Management was removed from the list.

Justin Meissner, NRCS Assistant State Conservationist for Easements

Justin reviewed ranking questions for Agricultural Land Easements (ALE) and provided proposed changes to several questions. These questions have already been sent out to the Wildlife Subcommittee for their consideration. Justin would like input back by April 12.

Kevin Derzapf, NRCS State Rangeland Management Specialist

Kevin presented information on NRCS's role in prescribed fire. One key aspect of the role NRCS plays in prescribed burning is that NRCS does not implement a prescribed fire for a producer. NRCS staff has strict training requirements for staff before they can even plan a burn. Prescribed fire is often a useful tool on the landscape but is not used often due to the landowner fears of liability, lack of contractors and public perception. There is currently a Prescribed Fire Council being formed in Montana.

Eric Larson, NRCS Water Supply Specialist

Eric provided an overview of the current mountain snowpack and the water supply outlook for Montana. The presentation included an explanation of the SNOTEL and Snow Course stations and how snow water equivalent is measured. Eric reviewed snowpack data in different watersheds that indicate we are behind on building snowpack. There is time left in the year to add to the snowpack but time is running short to make up the shortfall.

Lunch was provided by the Montana Association of Conservation Districts

Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ)

Mark Ockey from DEQ gave a presentation on the new faces at DEQ and opportunities for DEQ to support NRCS Targeted Implementation Plan development. Mark also expressed a need to reinvigorate the water subcommittee that could focus on both water quality and quantity.
